Professor Chris Kemp

Is a leading UK expert in crowd management and CEO of Mind Over Matter Consultancy, specializing in event safety and risk assessment.

• In response to the incident, Kemp co-founded the YES Group (Yourope Event Safety Group) with Henrik Bondo Nielsen of Roskilde Festival, aiming to improve safety standards across European festivals.

• Kemp collaborated with Roskilde Festival and partners like Mojo Barriers and Buckinghamshire New University to implement innovative crowd management strategies.

• His expertise contributed to the development of comprehensive safety measures at Roskilde, such as dividing audiences into pens, improving surveillance systems, and establishing emergency procedures to prevent future incidents.

Dr. Pascal Viot

Professor John Drury

• Drury has explored the unique relationship between festivals and its audience, highlighting how a foundation of mutual trust and shared identity contributes to effective crowd management and a sense of communal safety. A research that has created the foundation of how Roskilde Festival creates the crowd management strategies

• Drury's recent research on "show stops" provides critical insights into how audiences perceive safety and respond to interventions during live events, emphasizing the importance of clear communication and trust between organizers and attendees.

Professor Drury's expertise offers valuable perspectives on the psychological dynamics of crowds and the critical role of trust in ensuring safety at large-scale events, making his insights particularly relevant for professionals dedicated to enhancing crowd management practices.
